From the Pastor...

Sabbath Season

Here in the Northland, spring comes late and autumn early—making summer a highly treasured—and all too short—season of the year. When I lived in agricultural communities, summer was the time to work, but here, we are more likely to think of summer as a time for relaxation. "Summer" is likely to mean days at the beach or on the lake, time at the cabin, family reunions, camping trips and time outdoors, softball games, and, in general, a vacation from our usual responsibilities. I've come to think of summer in the northland as an annual "sabbath season."

The word "sabbath" comes from a Hebrew word meaning "to stop" or "to cease." In Sabbath time we stop our usual routines and cease much of that keeps our calendars full the rest of the year. My Old Testament professor, Dr. Walter Brueggemann, often said that sabbath was necessary in order to remind us that we are not self-made men and women. Goodness in our lives is not dependent upon how busy we keep ourselves, but on the quality of our relationships, our sense of community, our comfort with our selves, our appreciation of the natural world, and our trust in God's providence and care. Sabbath time—sabbath season—lets us focus on these things.

The Hebrew slaves organized their life with Sabbath time once every seven days. After all, God labored for six days to create the world and on the seventh, God rested. There were also Sabbath weeks that followed seven sabbaths. And the year of Jubilee, every fifty years, was a Sabbath year when even the fields were to be at rest.

There are lots of ways to observe Sabbath. A friend of mine, John Guttermann, made it his "Sabbath practice" to abstain from social media and email on Sundays. He has an automatic reply to whatever came to him over the weekend: "Thank you for your email. On Sundays, I take a break from my usual work. I will respond on Monday."

Another colleague hung a sign on his office door: "Sabbath begins at noon, Sunday. Gone fishin'. Back Monday."

Swimming at the lake, s'mores at the cabin, hikes in the woods, camping out under the stars, visiting grandparents and cousins and retelling old family stories—it's all part of Sabbath season.

At UPC, we're here every Sunday and invite you to worship as part of your summer Sabbath.

We give thanks to God for the life of his child Florence Voynich

Who left this life and joined the Church Triumphant on May 6, 2018. The family held a Celebration of Life at the Pattison Park Pavilion on May 20, 2018.

One Sunday in 1909, a young woman named Sonora Smart Dodd sat in a pew listening to a sermon honoring mothers. Her mother had died some years before, so her father had raised her by himself. She began to wonder why there wasn't a day to honor fathers.

Sonora decided to arrange for a tribute to be paid to her father at a church in her hometown of Spokane, Washington. The date was June 19, 1910. Many believe that this was the beginning of Father's Day.

Another view is that Dr. Robert Webb, pastor of Central Church, in Fairmont, West Virginia, held a service giving tribute to fathers in 1908. Regardless of which story is the correct one, it is certain that President Calvin Coolidge was the first president to choose a special day to honor fathers. He proclaimed the third Sunday in June as Father's Day in 1924.

This past Memorial Day we found many ways to honor our veterans. I've been thinking about an additional one.

My Dad was in the Army Engineers. He was a truck driver in the Aleutian Islands, where Japan was holding one of the islands. One day, when I was still living at home, he said to me, concerning Pearl Harbor, "You know, there was something fishy about that; why would you have all your battleships lined up in a row?"

Within the las 2 years I watched a PBS Documentary on Pearl Harbor and the key footage that grabbed me was one of our own radar operators saw a bunch of images on their screen and dutifully passed that on, but nothing came of it. At minimum, all the aircraft on carriers could have been scrambled and been in the air ready to engage at the harbor or out over the Pacific. The personnel on board ships could have been called to their battle positions. Today there are signs in many public places: "If you see something, say something." That radar person saw something and said something, but . . .

Moving ahead to 911. Weeks before those attacks, FBI field agent Coleen Rowley asked permission to do a broader investigation of Zacarias Moussaoui. Her request was blocked. Moussaoui was later indicted as a conspirator in the attacks. She saw something, and said something, but . . .

Moving ahead to the claim that Iraq had weapons of mass destruction and therefore needs to be invaded, PBS Frontline did a special documentary on our CIA's thorough intelligence gathering on that subject. Their findings show no evidence of weapons of mass destruction. Their findings were going to be shared by General Powell in his speech to the UN. That original speech was virtually rewritten by a Senior Whitehouse Official. The "no evidence of weapons of mass destruction" paragraphs were replaced with rhetoric calling for war. General Powell received his "new speech" minutes before he had to take the podium. He had no choice but to read it. Our CIA saw something, said something, but . . .

Another way to honor our veterans, first responders and their families is to honor them proactively, before they're killed or maimed in the horrors of war. One way to share your thoughts on any future decisions to go to war is by messaging John Bolton who is one of the President's closest advisors on this subject.


